

# Remembering N8M: 1966

**\*140 Teams played 8-Man football in 1966\***

Conde Sargent took over the World-Herald Prep Sports department from Gregg McBride in 1966. Western Nebraska boasted bragging rights in Sargent's first ever final ratings, placing Indianola, Paxton and Overton in a 1,2,3 slam. Below is his first Final Top Ten:

1966 was a season to remember for 8-Man and all of Nebraska high school football, as we recorded our state's very first 2,000 yard rusher.

Pleasanton's **Larry Riessland**, exploded for a mind-boggling 2,127 yards and 47 touchdowns on a grueling 247 carries. Averaging 8.6 yards a carry (averaging 31 carries per game). He scored NINE touchdowns in a single game, while rushing for 320 yards in another.

Riessland also completed 7 of 9 passes for 118 yards, caught 22 passes for 425 yards and intercepted 9 passes on defense.

The Pleasanton record setter was part of an impressive All-State backfield in 1966 that included Wilsonville quarterback, 6-1, 195 pound senior **Charles Haag**.

A deadly accurate passer, Haag completed a sizzling 70% of his 116 pass attempts, good for 1,480 yards and 19 touchdowns. Charles was also a fine defender, recording a pair of Pick-6s during the '66 season.

Rounding out an all-state backfield to remember was a well-known name out of Western Nebraska gridiron circles, ***Jerry Liess*** from State Champion Indianola.

Liess ran for 849 yards on 84 carries, averaging a first down every time he ran the ball Liess also completed 31 of 56 passes for 491 yards and 9 touchdowns.

That means Liess threw a touchdown pass every third time he put the ball in the air. He was also the second leading tackler on his team and added 6 punt returns for scores. Jerry was later inducted into the NEMFCA 8-Man Hall of Fame in 2024.

The top lineman in all of 8-Man football in 1966 had to be Bartlett's 5-10, 190 pound tough guy ***Al Childers***. A repeat selection, the athletic Childers was fully capable of chasing down an opposing running back as he ran a :10.9 hundred-yard dash.
